She later left the CAF, to marry and raise a family. As a service family she saw many moves across Canada, Europe and the US. She became a certified first responder and volunteer fire fighter until her health issues became so significant she could no longer pursue this career.


Not long after Cindy left the Military she experienced numerous physical and mental health issues. Eventually she was diagnosed with MS and PTSD, both traced back to her service career.

Cindy was fortunate enough to have a dog of a suitable breed, age and temperament that PLF determined could be properly trained. PLF accepted Gracie only after meeting her and evaluating her. Gracie's presence and skills allow Cindy to leave the house, shop, attend social functions and interact with people again. She lives a full life – a productive life and she's determined to give back to others. The incredible generosity Cindy received from the Pawsitive Love Foundation inspired her to establish **Veteran's Elite Canines Inc**.

London's Fanshawe College has entered an agreement with the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) in an effort to support military personnel enrolled at the post-secondary institution.

The MOU will allow Fanshawe and the CAF to develop a framework that will support military personnel who are currently studying at the College; provide heightened awareness to students about careers in the CAF; and support military members and veterans who are transitioning from active service through advanced standing in an academic program by recognizing their military training and experience. It has been created to provide students, members of the CAF and veterans with career opportunities and additional supports for transition.

Those enrolled in the program will receive individualized support and advice from Fanshawe staff trained to provide specialized military support. These students will gain leadership recognition on their co-curricular transcript resulting from a combination of their military training and co-curricular activities at Fanshawe.

Upon graduation, a Leadership notation will be made on their credential and recognized as part of the graduation ceremony.

The agreement was signed by Fanshawe President Peter Devlin and CAF Colonel Jason Guiney, on behalf of Brigadier-General Conrad Mialkowski, Commander of the 4<sup>th</sup> Canadian Division/Joint Task Force Central.

"As Canadians, we are grateful to those who are and have served and sacrificed for our country, preserving and protecting the freedoms we enjoy today", says Fanshawe President Peter Devlin. "Here at Fanshawe, we are pleased to offer our support and to provide a welcoming campus with services and resources available to meet the unique needs of military personnel."

"Members of the Canadian Armed Forces possess specialized military knowledge and skills acquired through education, training and experience", says Brigadier-General Conrad Mialkowski, Commander 4<sup>th</sup> Canadian Division/Joint Task Force Central. # Army Parking Lot Transforms into Emergency Command Centre

to it. It was specifically designed to provide a realistic, simulated reaction to a Request for Assistance (RFA) from a Canadian community; the type of scenario that could arise during natural and other disasters like flooding, ice storms, or tornadoes, for example.

Approximately 50 soldiers set up a mobile command and control node in the parking lot of Wolseley Barracks, and



If recent history is an indicator of future needs, the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) can expect to deploy to help Canadians in need, any time, at a moment's notice. With that reality in clearly in focus, Exercise TRILLIUM DRAGON 20 (TD20) was held on the weekend of February 21-23, 2020 at Wolseley Barracks in London, Ontario.

The exercise was based on a simulated domestic emergency scenario within Ontario, and the local Army Reserve's capability to work under higher headquarters and respond



operated at an intense and realistic operational tempo in order to fine-tune 31 Canadian Brigade Group's (31 CBG) Territorial Battalion Group (TBG), a subcomponent of the Brigade with a rotating command between 31 CBG units. The TBG stands at high-readiness for Domestic Operations (DOMOPS), and is currently led by Hamilton's Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders of Canada (Princess Louise's).

TRILLIUM DRAGON exercises, which

take place annually in preparation for real emergencies across Canada, are run by Joint Task Force Central (JTFC), one of six regional joint task forces of the CAF that are situated in key locations across Canada, and conduct continental operations.

JTFC has its headquarters in Toronto, and the JTFC Commander also commands 4th Canadian Division (4 Cdn Div). Brigadier-General C.J.J. Mialkowski, 4 Cdn Div and JTFC Commander, has the authority to form mission-appropriate task forces at any time,





force generate and mobilize a TBG for DOMOPS rapidly, and effectively.

"We run these simulated emergency response scenarios to practice communications between, and movement of, Army personnel so that we're prepared to help Canadians wherever we're needed," said Lieutenant-Colonel Peter St Denis, Commanding Officer of 31 TBG and the Argylls. "If the call for CAF assistance comes again this year, we'll be ready." which includes tasking any and all CAF resources held in the Province of Ontario by the Royal Canadian Navy, Canadian Army, and Royal Canadian Air Force.

As one of those assets, 31 CBG plays a critical role in maintaining readiness to respond to emergencies across Ontario, and the exercise confirmed the capacity to



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# Cadets take AIM towards the future!

February marks the beginning of competition season for those who like to take their chances on the firing line. Sea, Air and Army Cadets across Ontario began their competitive season with "Zone" competitions with the hopes of moving on to represent their areas at the Regional competition.

# 364 Lancaster Air Cadets Tour Chinook

On a sunny February afternoon in Windsor, Ontario, the cadets of 364 Lancaster Squadron were preparing to begin their weekly Drill with Arms Team practice when the sound of a helicopter could be heard in the background. This is not unusual as the squadron is located at Windsor International Airport (YQG). Howev-



er, as the volume increased, it became apparent that it wasn't one of the helicopters that are normally seen around the area. As the Cadets gathered on the apron of their training facility to admire the tandem rotor aircraft, it was Identified it as a CH-147F Chinook helicopter.

A while later a knock came on the door to the hangar. The Cadets had caught the attention of the Chinook's flight crew (one of whom was a former Cadet) and to their excitement, were invited for a tour of the helicopter. The lucky Cadets toured the aircraft for 45 minutes and were able to appreciate the storage capacity of the fuselage, as well as the instruments in the cockpit. They also were able to inspect the two large rotors of the Chinook up close. The flight crew answered questions on topics ranging from engineering to the experience and education required to operate the helicopter. They shared that they had been training in the United States for the past month and were returning to their home base, CFB Petawawa. However, because of impending bad weather they decided to stay in Windsor overnight.

For Sgt Currie, a cadet interested in aircraft maintenance, touring the Chinook was "a great oppor-



tunity to learn more about different career options in the aviation industry". Seeing the helicopter from the outside to the inside brought the theoretical knowledge to life. This was a unique experience for the cadets and they were grateful for the opportunity.

#### East Timor By Dave Barton

The Dutch and the Portuguese colonized the island of Timor in the 18th


century, the Dutch claiming the western portion (now Indonesia) and the Portuguese holding the east. In 1975 Indonesian-backed forces staged a coup overthrowing the Portuguese administration, ushering in over two decades of oppressive rule. The East Timorese are culturally different from the inhabitants of the western part, having their own language and religion. In August 1999, an East Timorese referendum voted 80% for independence. This sparked a campaign of violence by anti-independence militias, armed and supported by Indonesian security forces. 2,600 East Timorese were killed, 30,000 displaced

and 250,000 forced over the border into West Timor; it was a scorched earth policy. In September, the United Nations created the International Force in East Timor (INTERFET). By the end of the month, 4,000 troops from 16 nations, headed by Australia, were on the ground with the Force doubling by the next month. INTERFET quickly established a secure environment into which humanitarian aid could follow.

The Canadian Forces supplied 650 personnel which included HMCS Protecteur, a Sea King helicopter,

two C-130 Hercules and supporting naval and air personnel. The bulk of the ground force was a 250-man company from the 3e bataillon Royal 22e Regiment from Valcartier. The company was based in Zumalai and attached to the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion Royal New Zealand Regiment. The company was transported from Darwin to East Timor by the Australian assault ship *HMAS Tobruk*.

The soldiers first mission was to end the violence and establish security in the territory. The Van Doos conducted patrols through the burned land and the raised villages from Ainaro in the east to Suai in the west. However, much of their work was helping to rebuild the infrastructure and assist the villagers. Many of the troops gave up days off to pitch in.
