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

Dr. Sylvain Leblanc

Dr. Sylvain Leblanc, CD, BSc, MEng, PhD, PEng, is an Associate Professor, Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering at the Royal Military College of Canada in Kingston, Ontario.

Graduating from RMC, Sylvain (Sly) Leblanc served for 23 years as a Signals Officer with the Canadian Army. He served with the Special Service Force, including the Airborne Regiment Battle Group and a variety of strategic and tactical communications units.

His research interests are in computer security and computer network operations specializing in Network Counter-Surveillance Operations, Vulnerability & Security Assessments and Cyber Education. He is involved in research projects with the Canadian Forces Network Operations Centre, Defence Research and Development Canada - Ottawa's Cyber Operations and Signals Warfare Section and Canadian universities (Queen's, University of Ottawa, Concordia, École polytechnique de Montréal). He also served on the Board of Directors of the SERENE-RISC Smart Cyber Security Network. Dr. Leblanc collaborates with the Director Cyber Force Development with whom he works on Cyber Policy Conceptual Development and with the Canadian Army's Land Cyber Mission Assurance Program.

The Garden Tarty

Wolseley Barracks has a long tradition of inviting political, business and institutional leaders to the annual Garden Party where they could mix with the military staff. This was a process that fostered and strengthened links between the military and civilian communities. In London, the event has been dormant for some time but this year it is born again. HMCS Prevost will partner with 31 Canadian Brigade Group and the Garrison Community Council to host the 2018 Garden Party.

Regenerating the Garden Party has been a challenging task for the GCC who is the lead organizer. There are significant constraints - the reduction of CFB London, particularly the Officers' Mess, the challenges of securing fiscal support and sponsorship, and the space limitations of the venues. These constraints dictate a much reduced event from what some of you may have known in the past and what we would like the Garden Party to become. The largest impact is a limitation in numbers - we simply cannot invite everyone that we would like. Every GCC member will be invited, but we are unable to allow spouses and partners as has been the traditional custom.

This is the first Garden Party in many years. Let's get through the first year as a team and hopefully we will be able to build on it's success.


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This Month in Our History



1 May 1938	Canadian Army	The Tank School is moved to Camp Borden from London and renamed Canadian Armoured Fighting Vehicles School (CAFVS).
2 May 1885	Canadian Militia	Canadian Militia and Permanent Force soldiers battle Riel's forces at the Battle of Cut Knife during the North-West Rebellion.
4 May 1910	RCN	The Canadian Navy, later the Royal Canadian Navy, is authorized after Royal assent is given to the Naval Service Act of Canada.
5 May 1945	World War II	General Foulkes accepts the surrender of German forces in the Netherlands at Wageningen. Two days later all German military forces surrender to the Allied Forces in Europe.
8 May 1967	Canadian Armed Forces	The Canadian Forces Reorganization Act is given Royal assent and begins the unification of the separate Royal Canadian Navy, Canadian Army and Royal Canadian Air Force.
15 May 1660	La Nouvelle- France	Dollard-des-Ormeaux et ses compagnons sont tués par des Iroquois pendant qu'ils défendent un fort au Long Sault.
19 May 1951	RCN	Approval is given for the Royal Canadian Navy to begin work on the first Canadian military hydrofoil, <i>HMCS Bras D'Or</i> .
19 May 1951	RCAF	No. 410 begins receiving <i>Sabre</i> fighter aircraft, becoming the first Canadian squadron to fly these fighters.
21 May 1917	The Great War	The Imperial War Graves Commission (now the Commonwealth War Graves Commission) is established by Royal Charter.

Organizationally, Doug held several offices with the local OPSTF (Honorary Life Member), The Ontario Principal's Council (Founding Member, President, Honorary Life Member), and the Canadian Association of Principals (Board Member). Doug graduated from the Royal Military College in 1974 and was on the Supplementary Reserve List until it was discontinued. He was President and Chair of the Board at the Jet Aircraft Museum and currently, along with his wife, Marti, is Director of the Education Program which they developed (thanks GCC Starbase).

The Past President chairs the Bursary Committee and the Nominations Committee. He is also a member of the Garden Party Committee.





HMCS Prevost Will Participate in the HMCS Haida Ceremony



HMCS Haida, the world's last Tribal Class Destroyer, will be designated the **Honourary Royal Canadian Navy Flagship**. An event celebrating this designation will take place **Saturday May 26th** in Hamilton, Ontario at *HMCS HAIDA* (*http://www.hmcshaida.com*). Multiple Naval Reserve Divisions will participate in this ceremony, including HMCS YORK, HMCS STAR, and HMCS PREVOST. Parks Canada is coordinating the event and information is at *https://www.pc.gc.ca/en/lhn-nhs/on/haida*.



HMCS Haida is a Tribal-class destroyer that served in the Royal Canadian Navy from 1943 to 1963, participating in World War II and the Korean War. The only surviving Tribal class destroyer out of 27 vessels constructed for the RCN, Royal Navy and Royal Australian Navy between 1937 and 1945, *Haida* sank more enemy surface tonnage than any other Canadian warship and as such is commonly referred to as the "*Fightingest Ship in the Royal Canada Navy*". Designated a National Historic Site of Canada in 1984, she now serves as a museum ship berthed next to HMCS *Star*, an active Royal Canadian Naval Reserve Division, in Hamilton, Ontario.

The 1st Hussars is a Primary Reserve Armoured Reconnaissance Regiment of the Canadian Army. As part of 31 Canadian Brigade Group, the Regiment is based in London and Sarnia and provides the Brigade with highly motivated and trained armoured soldiers. The 1st Hussars has a long and storied history that includes the D-Day landings as well as more recent peacekeeping operations and support to the Afghan mission. While formal documents are legal in significance, the true symbol of transfer of the Regiment is the passing of the Guidon from the outgoing commander to the incoming.

The Regimental Guidon is the most sacred symbol of a Commonwealth Regiment. Bestowed by the Sovereign, its origins lay in French Cavalry regiments mounted on horseback, and it is emblazoned with selected battle honours from the Regiment's history.

Maintaining and Developing the Arctic Response Capability

Approximately 235 soldiers deployed to the Canadian Armed Forces Training Centre (CAFATC) in Resolute, Nunavut from February 4-17 for NOREX 18 to test mobility, sustainability and survivability. The training scenario: Responding to a military aircraft crash in the Arctic.

Sergeant Kyle Bezemer, an Army Communication and Information Systems Specialist from 31 Signal Regiment, operates a field radio during NOREX 18 near Resolute, Nunavut on February 1, 2018.

Even soldiers with multiple deployments found the exercise rewarding. *"Travelling to an area most people will never see is an opportunity I always jump at."* Master Corporal Michael Lawrence said during his fifth trip north of 70.

"Not many people get the chance to go to the Arctic." said nineteen-year-old Corporal Rebecca Craddock, a Reservist from the Grey and Simcoe Foresters. "Up here, you need to work as a team just to survive."

Throughout the exercise, Reservists, Regular Force troops and Rangers learned and practiced arctic survival and winter warfare skills together – including live-fire ranges, constructing snow shelters, erecting and inhabiting arctic tent groups, and operating survival equipment on foot patrols and long snowmobile missions.

Sharing best practices and lessons-learned were key to mission success. "*Training and mentoring go hand-in-hand with the challenges that come with [Arctic operations].*" said Sergeant Kyle Bezemer of 31 Signal Regiment, Hamilton. "*An exercise like NOREX forces us to learn from each other.*"


